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His bio says he was selected for the Young Millionaire's Club of Edmonton, Canada, before the age of 30. He taught mechanical engineering at the university level and now has more than thirty years of experience in the public utility and energy business which included managing multibillion-dollar projects.

The company Szabo now heads in Budapest is called Gamma Manager Kft., which manages technology for Electro Erg Limited (EEL). Its predecessor began in Edmonton in 1963, providing consulting to utilities internationally. The project to produce an over-unity (more output than input) non-nuclear generator began 26 years ago. Gamma Manager has been developing the generator at laboratories in Texas, Toronto, England and eventually Hungary. One of the challenges they met was to hire specialists who were open-minded and scientific. They designed one unit of rotating electromagnetic equipment after another in attempts to find a shape of electromagnetic field that would be most effective.

The company's backers spent more than \$400 million on research. EBM technology was patented in a number of countries during the development phase, but Szabo says that commercial versions will be protected in two ways:

Also at the Tesla Congress I met with my German publisher. In 1998 Martin Mose of Omega Verlag had added a chapter into the second edition of *From Energy to the Cosmos* edition of my book *The Coming Energy Revolution*, so I asked him for further news about it. The chapter is about German engineer Wilfried Mohren, who invented a device that draws damp soils or buildings without the use of any known electrical current. This invention has already saved cultural monuments from decay. Mohren has received honors and awards for his invention. In 1995 he was given Austria's title, the Kaplan Medal. More than 20,000 of his “Aquapuf” units have been installed successfully in Europe, even in the Hungarian Parliament in Budapest and in the House Museum in Eisenstadt, Austria.

As so often happens with the new paradigm, today's science can't explain why his device works. The inventor believes that energy from the all-pervading background (zero-point energy) seems to play an important role in it.

The story began when Mohren was a student engineering in a hard. His permission instruments were kept in a damp cellar and its constantly rising. This annoyed Mohren, but also opened him to think about damp walls and to look for a solution. The problem is that conventional devices for drying damp walls consume large amounts of electrical current and also tend to break down.

Inventive Mohren began to experiment. From study of physics he knew that water molecules can be directed with certain energy or force fields. After experimenting, he assumed there would be a dynamic earth force field. It is possible to use this physical energy field to heat his damp walls. Obviously this company is not about to give away the recipe. Nor are they promising the Holy Grail which so many are looking for—the blueprint for a small, decentralized self-powered energy converter that can run a home or a neighborhood. Instead, Szabo thinks like the utility company businessman he is. Gamma Manager is taking orders for power plants. The installed cost for the smallest, the three-megawatt electric generating plant, is \$8 million.

Although the prices are out of my range and probably you aren't in the market for megawatts and crushingly heavy generators either, your local utility could keep an eye on this. Szabo says the turnkey (installed power plant) price can be paid back from profits in less than four years. Prices include fuel costs for 40 years. The Russians are looking at it for powering locomotives.

What about feeding the surplus fed back into the EBM machine to make it a stand-alone generator? The company says it can only be done with very large heavy generators and they're not there yet. Nevertheless, let's celebrate this breakthrough—thoroughly tested generators for an over-unity power plant!

He installed his device, placed within a woven box that looked somewhat like a beehive, and to everyone's surprise damp cellars drained noticeably after months. In one case an extremely damp floor dried out.

After two years of testing, Mohorn applied for the first patent on his device which he called Aquapol. The syllable pol is short for polarization. He called the physical principle of his discovery magnetokinesis, because a magnetic-like field causes humidity to move.

Mohorn founded his company Aquapol in 1985. As he continued to improve his invention it was getting easier to convince people about the efficiency of his technology.

The Germans I spoke with said Mohorn's Aquapol system irritates the construction industry in his region, because the industry loses former income from repairing repeated encroachment of plaster which is otherwise common in damp old buildings.

There were setbacks as well as successes; some customers complained that the device did not work. Mohorn agreed that his technique had in those cases failed, and refunded their money. He says he despaired until he recognized the cause. Near radio and TV broadcasting stations, his antenna-like units were disturbed. He solved the problem by including electromagnetic interference suppressors.

Sometimes there were other cases in which the device didn't seem to work. Mohorn found no explanation until he heard the late Dr. Shiuji Inomato of Japan lecture in Hungary. After being inspired by Inomato, Mohorn felt that he would find the solution for his technical problems in the area of space energy—zero point energy.

For two years the inventor left his company to investigate the potential connection of such energy with his Aqua-pol device. Gradually he developed a theory of why his units worked only half the time in certain places; it was because the dynamic earth-force-field constantly changes its polarization at some places. He rebuilt his device so it adapts to changing polarization, and developed a new reception antenna. After much testing he discovered how to make the device work independent of its direction. Previously, after the devices were cleaned and reinstalled they often had ceased to work.

If you're a techie, you'll want to know how Aquapol devices are made. All I have been told is that they consist of three main parts. The receiver unit is made of two different flat spiral antennas. Mohorn believes the device sucks in the dynamic earth-force-field, which becomes funnel-shaped at that location. The polarization unit consists of a cylindrical air-core choke which continuously polarizes the received energy, which is right-circling. This polarized earth-force-field is passed on to the broadcasting unit. The broadcasting unit consists of special antennas and three tetrahedron-shaped redirection-coils which are also cylindrical air-core chokes. This broadcasting unit transmits the polarized earth-force-field into the room and causes water molecules in damp walls to "walk" downwards.

Until 1991 Mohorn thought that it was the postulated earth-force-field alone that made his units work. But he found that the radius of activity built up by the Aquapol-device is in practice much larger than the conical energy-suction-space. After hearing Dr. Inomata's lecture, Mohorn speculates that space energy flows from above into the unit to reinforce it. He says that in 1995 this was proven with tests in Graz, Austria, but I don't have details of the tests.

Has Mohorn discovered a new type of generator which changes zero-point energy directly into another form of energy? He says the energy-form used by his device has a wave character similar to known electromagnetic waves, but he believes there's a difference in composition and building of the wave structure. In his view, the new-found wave type consists of a magnetic wave and a gravitory wave which circles around the magnetic wave. The wave components both circle around the spreading axis. It operates differently than electromagnetic waves as emitted from satellites, for example. Mohorn calls this new-found energy-form 'gravomagnetism.'

"To my opinion," Mohorn says, "gravity actually is a product of space energy which penetrates earth. Out of the difference of the space energy which enters our planet and that which emerges from it again, a force arises which is directed towards the earth.... According to my findings the magnetism of earth results from the rotation movement of our planet rather than from ferromagnetic matter within the earth. The Swiss physician Christian Monstein was able to prove this experimentally and mathematically. I even go one step further and claim that the earth is rotating because space energy enters increasingly and is funnel-shaped at its poles. If entering space energy causes the earth to rotate and this rotation causes the magnetism of earth, the conclusion is that also the magnetism of earth is a product of space energy."

"When it (the space energy) interacts with matter or penetrates it, it partly changes into different forms of energy—gravity, magnetism, gravomagnetism, etc. When it penetrates the earth layers it is marked by every material with its matter-specific frequency. Thereby the gravomagnetic earth-field with its different frequencies is built. At the earth's surface it emerges in reduced form. And it is exactly this low-powered earth-field which enters my Aquapoldevice from below, and it is reinforced by entering space energy from above."

Mohorn's dehydration units only emit or broadcast right-circular force-fields. The inventor is convinced that in the future these biologically active fields will also be used for healing purposes. In experiments, however, the Austrian engineer also managed to broadcast left-circular force-fields. He noticed they cause humidity to be moved upwards. This effect might perhaps be useful in agriculture to moisten dry soil during droughts. "One of my further goals is to also fertilize deserts with this technology," says Mohorn.

Mohorn's theories oppose conventional science's teachings about earth's magnetism and gravity. Regardless, the Aqua-pol-device works. It saves historic buildings, and users only pay a fraction of the costs that they would spend for conventional drainage. Mohorn's units work in an environmentally friendly manner and without electrical current. In the late 1990s he calculated that his 20,000 installed Aquapol units help save enough gigawatt-hours of electrical current to heat about 2,000 average houses or medium-sized apartments.

My German editor told me that this Austrian inventor has set himself an ambitious long-term goal: not only saving electrical current and heating energy but also producing energy. But for now Mohorn is happy that, thanks to his invention, his little castle in Reichenau on the Rax river that was once very damp now has dry feet again. From what I heard, Wilhelm Mohorn is a gifted intuitive whose non-conventional but effective inventions raise further questions about the mysteries of water and of the sea of energy we live in.
